

Social media and education: Learning how to network safely and productively

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Context

- ◆ As of 2011, 80% of Canadians (aged 16+) use the Internet
 - ◆ 58% report using social network sites regularly
- ◆ As of September 2012, 52.7% of Canadians are Facebook subscribers
- ◆ 71% of teens in North America own a cell phone

Social Media: Pros & Cons

- ◆ Self-actualization and personal expression
 - ◆ Building community, social activism
 - ◆ Narcissism, hatred, extremism
- ◆ As of 2010, The Hate Directory (Franklin, 2010) listed around 2,000 hate websites, hundreds of hate groups, 100+ racist blogs

Research Project

- ◆ Changing nature of social interactions
- ◆ Objectives:
 - ◆ Perspectives
 - ◆ Power
 - ◆ Pedagogical potential

Data Analysis

- ◆ 10, 305 discussion threads
- ◆ *“Was the war in Iraq justified?”* (911 interactions)
- ◆ 6 super-users (Venkatesh, Shaikh et al., 2012)
- ◆ Computer-mediated discourse analysis (Herring, 2004)
 - ◆ Actualizing vs. Dutiful citizen (Bennett, Wells, & Rank, 2009)
 - ◆ Personally responsible vs. Participatory vs. Justice oriented citizen (Westheimer & Kahne, 2004)

Research Findings

- ◆ Changing perspectives longitudinally

“The Taliban were [sic] providing security for Bin Laden and his organization to train, arm, recruit, and plot further mischief. They were financing themselves with Opium grown in Afghanistan, and running a number of training camps indoctrinating and crafting a more lethal terrorist force. We had to take them out. Pretty simple.”

Research Findings

- ◆ Changing perspectives longitudinally

“How about you put your own politics aside - your own hatred of America - and listen to the Iraqis - not the ones with the rocket launchers - listen to the common peaceful Iraqi. I plan to listen hard - because we require their friendship if we are to turn a stable government over to Iraq - which should be everyone’s goal regardless of politics. [...] I think Tully & I have a common interest - the stability of Iraq - so I would like to work with him towards this goal.”

Affordance of Social Media

- ◆ Social media provides spaces for dissenting views to be forwarded and legitimized.
- ◆ Violence, hatred, and extremism tend to “flourish in circumstances in which there are no legitimate political channels for the expression of grievances” (Mouffe, 2005, p. 81).
